### A Message From The Head




#### **New Satellite Links**

The School has just installed the very latest in satellite technology which will enable students to receive educational television programmes from all over the world. The four channel directional dish includes Astra, Intelsat and Eutelsat 1 & 2 and will enable the School to pick up broadcasts from as far afield as the USA, Europe and the Middle East.

The wide ranging coverage of news, sport, documentaries and language programmes has already proven a boon to those students on Business & Finance and German and Japanese Language courses.

In addition, the School also has access to the Discovery Channel which features science and nature programmes specially developed as part of a joint collaborative European television venture. Also installed is the Dartcom weather satellite dish which will enable the Geography students to obtain detailed maps and images from satellites in geostationary orbit.

Systems manager, Mr Kevin Samujh, said, "The satellite links will enable the students to experience many aspects of technology at first hand and provide an excellent educational resource."
