

Congratulations to all our Sixth Form students who contributed to the 100% success rate at BTEC National and A level examinations last August.

The eagerly awaited results which were confirmed in August represented a formidable achievement and far surpassed the current national average of 89.9%.

University courses have proved the most popular destinations for our first cohort of Sixth Form leavers. Many earned distinctions and merits following the BTEC vocational route into Higher Education.

Notable successes include Kuldip Clair who found his distinctions in Business and Finance earned him a place at Loughborough University.

Jonathan Williams gained distinctions for a major design technology project. He was the first student to gain an unconditional offer at the University of Wolverhampton where he is now studying Computer Aided Design.

Danuta Tiebel a BTEC Science student is training with Queen Alexandra's Royal Nursing Corps and Rebecca Davies begins an RGN course at New Cross Hospital in January.


## Cinderella on Tour

#### **Top Notch Dunkers**

Thomas Telford School play host to the England Under 14 girls basketball squad on a number of weekend training sessions until Easter 1995.

The eighteen girls were selected after an inter-area tournament at the Lilleshall National Sports Centre. Coached by Helen Barnet, the squad will be training and playing a number of local games in preparation for the qualifying tournament of the Cadette Women's European Basketball Championships in 1995.

The School's sports staff and Sixth Form Leisure Studies students put the girls through their paces with a specially designed series of personal fitness tests. The squad beat Ercall Wood 103 - 100 but lost to a mixed Thomas Telford team 56 - 62.

Deputy Head and Leisure Studies Manager, Mike Douch, said, 'This was a great opportunity to support our national team and a unique chance for our students to meet and work with such a committed group of players.'

#### Gymnastics Judges

Humanities teacher Mrs Gail Comerford and Sixth form students Julie Marriott and Claire Lomas completed a club gymnastics judging course at the end of October which took place at Newman's College, Birmingham.

During the course they were taught to score on the beam, vault, bar and floor and all passed with flying colours.

They are now qualified to judge at regional competitions and both Julie and Claire will be judging at the Shropshire Schools competition on the 19th of March. In addition, Mrs Comerford will be participating in the judging of the Shropshire County gymnastics competition later in the year.
