# **Top Honours All Round!**


2001 marked the Tenth Anniversary of Thomas Telford School and it proved to be a remarkable year with honours all round!

In February an outstanding Ofsted report showed the highest standards of teaching ever recorded by HM Inspectors of Schools with Ofsted's description of the School as a place "where teachers and students share a love of learning."

In June, students, staff and Governors were delighted when it was announced in The Queen's Birthday Honours List that the Headmaster was to receive a Knighthood for his services to education. The first hint of this news came at the regular staff briefing session on Friday afternoon when Sir Kevin thanked staff for their hard work and support and suggested that it might just be worth keeping an eye on the media on Saturday.

Every student received a letter from the Headmaster on the morning of the announcement saying: "Everyone at TTS is part of this honour and I am most grateful to you all." Chairman of Governors, Mr Roy Harrison, commented: "The Governing Board sees the Headmaster's award not only as a recognition of Sir Kevin's remarkable ability, commitment and enthusiasm but also as an endorsement of the educational philosophy at Thomas Telford School."

July saw the best ever Year 9 SAT results with 98% of the students achieving Level 5 and above, whilst in August, A Level/GNVQ results were the best to date. The GCSE results again broke national records when every student achieved at least **nine** GCSE passes at the higher grades. Amongst some outstanding personal results, Hannah Isaacs achieved 9A\* and 3A passes while Tim Furness gained 6A\* and 3As.

Then in November, the School was singled out for praise by Estelle Morris, the Secretary of State for Education and Skills, when the Secondary School Performance Tables showed that Thomas Telford School was one of only two comprehensive schools with a 100% GCSE pass rate at A\*-C.

Finally, in December, came the news that the School had been awarded a Charter Mark for the third time, signifying Government approval for the very high quality services provided for students, parents and the wider community. Following a rigorous assessment by a Cabinet Office team, the School was highly praised for its achievements, in particular, the commitment towards continuous improvement and the culture of care and respect amongst staff and students.




The Sixth Form students gained qualifications and some of the Key Skills required by the new, broader Sixth Form study programme.



# **Top Scientist visits School**

One of the country's foremost scientists, Professor Richard Catlow, visited the School last March to give a lecture to A Level students on computational chemistry.

Professor Catlow is a member of the Royal Institution of Great Britain, the Director of the Davy Faraday Research Laboratory and the Wolfson Professor of Natural Philosophy. The Royal Institution was founded in 1799 and has had a profound effect on scientific research and education since that time. Its members have included Sir Humphrey Davy who, as well as inventing the famous miners safety lamp which bears his name, also made many important chemical discoveries; Michael Faraday who discovered electro-magnetism and Sir Ernest Rutherford who is regarded as the father of atomic science.

Professor Catlow also performed the opening ceremony for the School's Science Open Evening which provided an opportunity for parents to see what goes on in a Science lesson in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.







The Junior Boys became our most successful team when they finished in second place in the Sportscore Regional Championships at Tipton, having already won the County Cup for the fifth time in six years. At Tipton, the boys recorded our highest ever points total for this age group, only missing out on a place in the national final by four points.
