Students will be taught how to write well-structured paragraphs for the analysis, evaluation, and comparison questions, and the elements paragraphs must contain to succeed at GCSE. Students will be tasked with writing a refined letter, speech, and article related to the subject matter taught to develop their transactional writing skills. 	 Encourage your child to read widely for pleasure, listening to them read and discussing their reading if possible. Encourage your child to revise content taught in school from their class notes or resource booklets, testing them on the key concepts and vocabulary for each topic if possible. Encourage your child to revise their knowledge of grammar by visiting the grammar pages on the BBC Bitesize website. Encourage your child to use Sparknotes or Litcharts to enrich their understanding of the extracts. Encourage your child to practise writing paragraphs related to the extracts, whilst considering a variety of characters and themes. Encourage your child to write pieces of transactional writing at home.
English Literature (AQA): Modern Text – 'Animal Farm' or 'Telling Tales Prose Anthology'	 Students will begin reading the Modern GCSE text. This will be one of their examined GCSE texts. Students will focus on understanding plot, character, and setting linking this to the impact it has on the audience. Students will be introduced to relevant contextual influences that will allow them to extend their interpretations of the text. 	 Encourage your child to read widely for pleasure, listening to them read and discussing their reading if possible. Encourage your child to revise content taught in school from their class notes or resource booklets, testing them on the key concepts and vocabulary for each topic if possible. Encourage your child to use Sparknotes or Litcharts to enrich their understanding of the set texts.

- Students will be taught how to write wellstructured paragraphs and the elements paragraphs must contain to succeed at GCSE.
- Students will build on their prior knowledge of writing about whole texts. Students will not be required to analyse passages for this text, but must be able to write complete essays.
- Encourage your child to practise writing paragraphs related to the texts, whilst considering a variety of characters and themes.
- Encourage your child to research relevant contextual influences related to the set text.
- Take your child to the theatre to watch a performance of the text or encourage them to watch a film version.
