- Students will be introduced to relevant contextual influences that will allow them to extend their interpretations of the poems.
- Students will be taught how to write wellstructured paragraphs and the elements paragraphs must contain to succeed at GCSE.
- Students will begin comparing poems once they demonstrate a secure understanding of individual poems, and an ability to explore individual poems.
