Meet the Head

HEAD Teacher at the Thomas Telford School is Kevin Satchwell, who takes up his appointment on January 1, 1991.

Currently head of Moseley Park School, Bilston, he has built up an outstanding reputation in the West Midlands.

Educated at Wednesbury Boys High School, he gained his Certificate of Education at Shoreditch College, London University. He has a Bachelor of Arts degree and an advanced diploma in educational management at the Open University, and is a visiting lecturer at Manchester University Business School.

IN SEPTEMBER next year, the most exciting school in the West Midlands will open its doors to pupils for the first time.

The Thomas Telford School is currently being constructed on a site overlooking Telford Town Centre and if you live in either Telford or Wolverhampton and have a child who is 11 or 16 years old by August 31, 1991, you should apply now for a place.

There are no fees involved and there will be a non-competitive entry scheme which means that children of all abilities may apply. There will be no problems getting your child to the Thomas Telford School; if you live more than three miles away, free transport will be provided.

The School will enjoy all of the outstanding features of a City Technology College:-

- Study which adds more science, technology and business to the national curriculum
- A technologically sophisticated environment.
- Space, furnished and equipped for individual learning.
- Close working with industry and commerce to ensure job readiness.
- Small classes and even smaller teams of students.
- A full range of student ability and social background.
- Involvement of parents in the School's activities.
- Teachers specifically selected and prepared to take advantage of the School's facilities.

Children of all abilities may apply – NOW!!

The first intake of students will involve 168 eleven year olds and 80 sixteen year olds. The school will grow annually until it has a full enrolment of 1,000.

When it opens, the Thomas Telford School will be the eighth City Technology College to be established in Britain, since the first was launched in Birmingham last year.

As with all other such colleges, the Thomas Telford School will be sponsored. The two sponsors are the *Mercers' Company*, the premier Livery Company or Guild of the City of London, and *Tarmac*, the Wolverhampton-based quarrying, building materials and construction group.

A Guide to the Admissions Procedure

HOW TO APPLY

To apply for a place:

Fill in your application form and send it to reach the office by October 31st., 1990.

Arrangements for interviews:

You will be asked to come with your child for an interview at a time and date convenient to you.

Your child will be given assessment tasks to complete when you come for your interview.

You will be asked if you have any questions and what hopes you have for your child's future.

The interview and assessment tasks will last about one hour.

Admission Decisions:

Efforts will be made to secure an intake which reflects the balance of the communities.

To make sure that every applicant has an equal chance of being admitted the following rules will be applied:

Of the places for 11 year olds, a number will be given to each electoral ward, according to the number of 11 year olds in that ward.

Of the places for each ward, a quota of places will be given to boys and girls, according to the number of each in the ward.

Of the quota for each ward, places will be given to each of five ability bands according to the number of applicants in that band. The ability band to which a child belongs will be determined by the assessment tasks taken at interview.

The final selection from each ability band in each quota of places will be made by experienced interviewers working to common guidelines, aimed at deciding how much advantage a child would gain by a place in the Thomas Telford School as compared with a place in other secondary schools.

Since the number of places in the school is fixed and since admissions are not competitive, but are based on judgements of the relative benefit to the child, there is no possibility of appeals being considered.

Offers of Places

Places will be offered by December 31st, 1990, and acceptances must be received by January 14th, 1991. In the event of a place not being accepted, it will be offered to the next child on the reserve list in the same ability band and quota.

Since the number of places is limited, not everyone who applies can be guaranteed a place. To be safe, all applicants should also follow their local education authority's request to select a maintained school for next year. The chance of gaining a place at the Thomas Telford School will not be affected by doing this.
