Pioneering Package

STUDENTS at Thomas Telford School will shortly be helping to develop a revolutionary interactive computer program which will enable them to learn a language through the use of moving pictures, sound, graphics and text together on screen. The project, codenamed 'Eloquent', is already being seen as the 21st Century replacement for the language cassette and is being subsidised by the European Community's 'Lingua' programme.

Based on a range of Acorn computers, the European consortium of colleges and companies who will be promoting the package aim to be at the leading edge of technology - driven learning methods. As only 18% of the European Community speak English as their mother tongue, Thomas Telford School is committed to developing new ideas and using the latest technology to ensure that our students can take their place in the European workforce of today.

Europe 1992

SIXTH Form students from Thomas Telford School, France and Italy will take part in a three week exchange this September as part of a European Community plan to develop greater cultural understanding between the participating countries.

The group were selected after a series of interviews and will leave for Briançon in France on 31 August for the first leg of their visit. Their immediate task will be to look at the relationship between the similar history of this French town and Ironbridge. The event looks set to become a major media event in France and Italy with extensive radio and television coverage.

The trip will also include visits to the

Geneva Parliament buildings and the chance to do some white water rafting and glacial skiing.

Group leader, Mr Jonathan Boyle, said, "the exchange affords all the students taking part an excellent opportunity to improve their understanding of what it means to be a European today. I am sure they will all benefit greatly from this experience."

Thomas Telford students will host the home leg of this exchange from 14 September when apart from visiting the School, the students will visit the Black Country Museum, Granville Country Park and the International Heritage Sites around Ironbridge.

Achievements

ALSO in connection with the Duke of Edinburgh Award, further congratulations go to Design Technology student, Jonathan Williams, who, in conjunction with Telford Police Crime Prevention Unit, arranged a new initiative to combat the town's spiralling incidence of car crime. A recent public display in the School's Technology Area helped highlight the problem and enabled the students to give away a large number of free window etching vouchers.

Hot Off The Presses

A GROUP of over twenty students, parents and staff are busy preparing the first edition of a regular termly newspaper which will feature examples of work, a swap shop, interviews, current affairs, competitions and much more.

Year 7 student, Ruth Lister, came up with the initial idea, but this quickly grew to an editorial team of twenty six who meet every Monday night from 4pm to 6pm and will have an initial circulation of around three hundred copies. However, the newspaper will be environmentally friendly being printed on recycled paper.

Green Initiatives

A JOINT project between Thomas Telford School and Hinkshay Special School has resulted in the creation of a 'Wildlife Garden' aimed at attracting rare butterflies and birds whose natural habitats are in decline. Forty Year 7 students were specially recruited to provide the manpower to landscape the site in the grounds of Hinkshay School as part of the School's environment module which took place during the first three weeks of June.

In addition to creating a suitable wildlife environment, the students also constructed a hide to enable the children to observe, draw and photograph the site as it develops. Deputy Head, Mike Douch, coordinated the event and was keen to praise all those who took part for the excellent effort and all the hard work they put in. "This initiative has provided an excellent opportunity to pursue cross-curricular links in many subject areas including environment, geography, technology and science," he said.



Work Placement

ARRANGEMENTS of work placements for Thomas Telford's Sixth Form students are, "bombing along" according to Malcolm Scotto, the School's Senior Industrial Consultant. "A place has now been finalised for every student to spend time in a commercial or industrial location either locally in Telford and Wolverhampton or as far off as Birmingham, Oxford and even London."

Students will be involved with a large number of organisations and will be involved in a wide range of activities such as manufacturing garments from recycled material, writing computer programs, designing a luggage rack for a Hong Kong bus, testing aircraft components, teaching and photography to name but a few.

Mr Scotto also noted, "all this would not have been possible without the assistance of the students, staff, parents and the enthusiasm of the many companies who agreed to have the students on work placement."

Editor-in-chief, English Teacher, Deborah Mundy, said, "the project was the idea of a few Year 7 students who wanted to experience at first hand the running of their own newspaper. They will be totally responsible for the whole publication from

start to finish and will gain a detailed knowledge of a range of media production techniques from desk-top publishing to photography."

The first edition will be available in September.

County Champions


