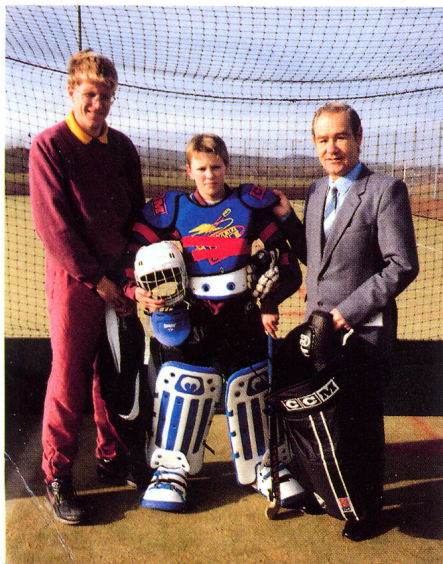
Honour for Chairman

Virtually Real Teachers!

Thomas Telford School is to establish a 'Virtual Classroom' that will link students here to teachers based in other locations around the country as well as allowing teachers with specialist expertise in this School to teach groups of students in other areas.

The Virtual Classroom is based on video conferencing technology which provides a large image of the remote teacher who can see the students and talk directly to them. 'Electronic Whiteboards' on each end of the link will relay information and act as a giant computer screen. TTS will link with John Cabot College in Bristol, Dixons CTC in Bradford and Applemore College in Southampton. The DFEE is providing some supportive funding.

Mr Len Adam, Project Manager at TTS, said: "The virtual classroom will increase choice for our students. If, for example, a small number of students here wished to learn Spanish but the class would be too small to be financially viable, using this technology we could link with a class in one of our partner schools."

Christmas Treat for Children's Ward

Just before Christmas, Year 11 French students presented a giant size jar of Roses chocolates and a huge tube of Smarties to the patients in the Children's Ward at Princess Margaret Hospital in Telford. French teacher, Miss Jill Corser said: "The students had arranged a collection amongst themselves for their own Christmas treat and then one of them, Martyn Haynes, suggested doubling their contributions and spending half the proceeds on sweets for the Hospital. The patients were delighted!"



Our First GCSE Results - Outstanding

When the Government League Tables were published in November, Thomas Telford School ranked 33rd among the top comprehensive schools nationally.

Last summer, our first students to take GCSEs saw their hard work rewarded with outstanding results. An impressive 76% of the students gained 5 or more GCSEs Grades A*-C which is more than double the local average for Telford and Wolverhampton schools and over 30% higher than the national average. 100% of our students achieved GCSE qualification with 99% achieving at least 5 or more GCSE passes. Consequently, 95% of these students are continuing Post 16 education.

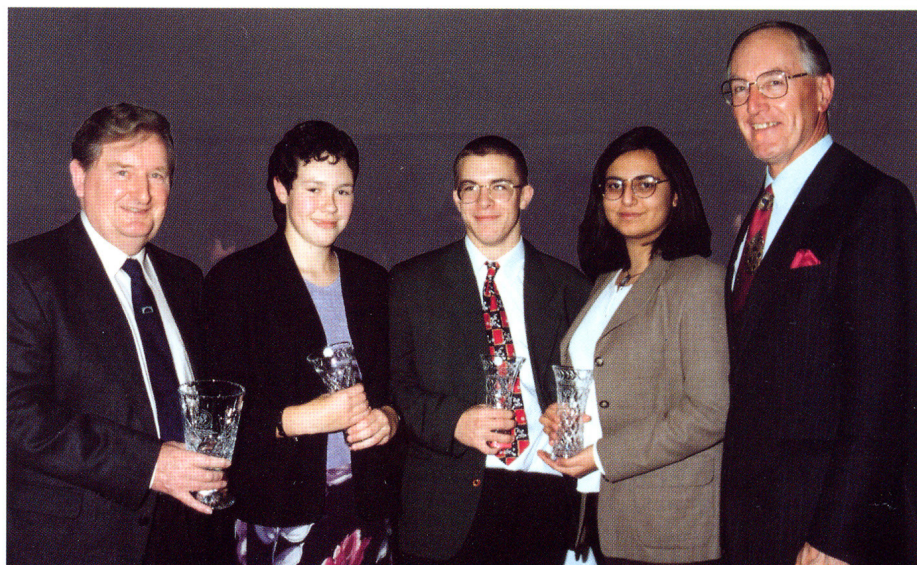
Mr Kevin Satchwell said "These figures are outstanding and of significant importance both locally and nationally as they demonstrate what can be achieved by students from the full range of ability. They show that comprehensive education does work especially when the working conditions of students and management flexibility available to the headteacher are combined appropriately. These achievements are largely due to the fact that our students work a significantly longer week than students from neighbouring schools - an extra ten hours per week teaching is the norm here."

Headmaster comment

Many parents have contacted me to ask why we were not afforded the accolade of Outstanding School by Her Majesty's Chief Inspector, Chris Woodhead.

In conversation with Mr Woodhead's office, I was informed that because we are a new school we need to repeat our outstanding examination performance next year to achieve this status.

Parents, teachers and students should however be congratulated as Thomas Telford School has met all the other criteria. I have every confidence that our students will do well in the forthcoming examinations so that we can be allocated Outstanding School status next year.

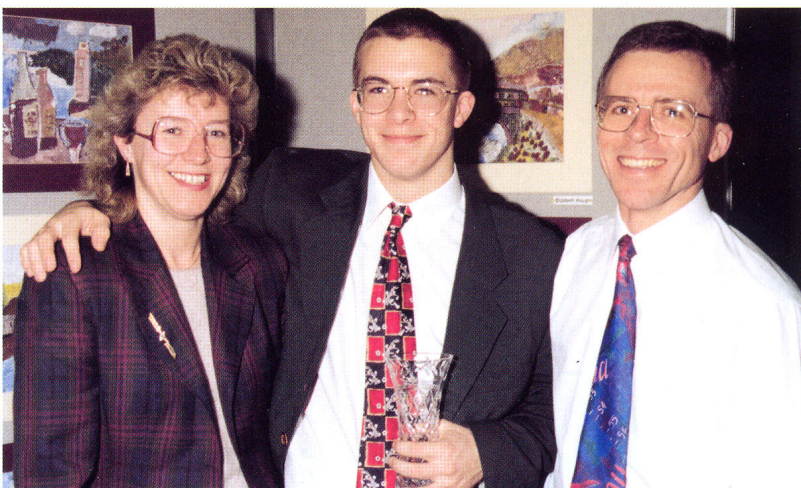


Year 11 Achievement Evening

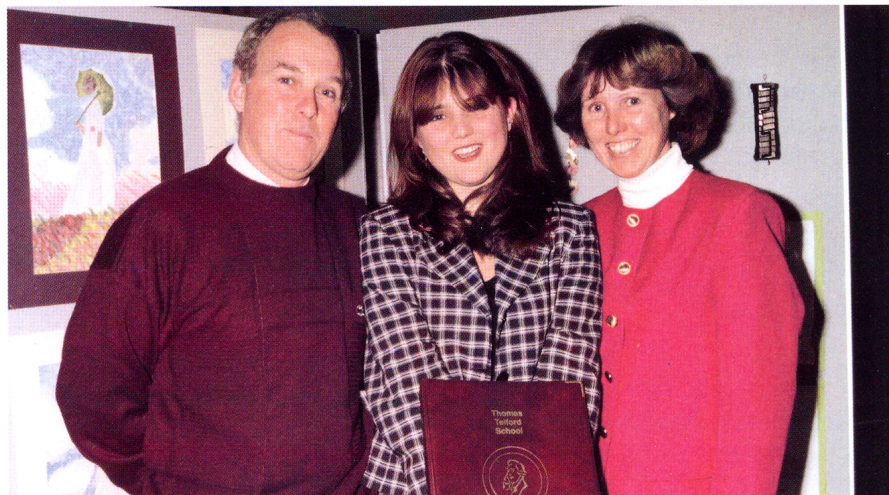


Celebrating GCSE Success

Miss Roberts commented: "I have been very impressed by the manner in which students manage both their studies and bank duties and am convinced that skills learned running the bank will stand them in good stead in their chosen careers".

Year 10 Business Studies students visited the Grand Theatre in Wolverhampton recently as part of their studies for coursework involving a fictitious theatre called The Broadway.

The students' brief is to investigate ways of reducing expenditure and increasing income to make The Broadway more profitable.

One of the options available is to refurbish the theatre and because the Grand Theatre is currently in the process of raising the finance for refurbishment, the Managing Director, Mr Brian Goddard, kindly arranged for a guided tour both front and back stage of the theatre for the students and then spent some time talking them through the various methods being used at the theatre to raise finance and control spending.

Business Teacher, Mrs Julie Wilde, commented: "We are very grateful to Mr Goddard for finding the time to talk to the students; the visit to the Grand Theatre proved an invaluable experience and helped the students to focus their attention on methods of raising finance."

Science Students on the Crest of a Wave

Around 100 Year 8 students have received Bronze Crest Awards in a scheme which promotes science and technology in schools aiming to develop problem solving and investigative skills.

Many varied projects were undertaken by the students. For example, Victoria Wylde and Rebecca Caine designed a system using renewable sources such as solar and geothermal energy for purifying sea water for use on a desert island.

The School is taking delivery of its new minibus, a 17 seater LDV Convoy D this Spring. Painted in a high-visibility colour (yellow) with the Thomas Telford School logo in burgundy, it has many safety features.

The basic vehicle was stripped down and fitted with side impact bars, vertical pillar supports, a rear impact protection bar, roof roll cage and emergency escape hatch. Internal fixtures are of a high specification fire retardant material and include safety seats with head and neck supports, lap and diagonal inertia restraints, reinforced seat anchorage rails and illuminated exit and emergency escape signs. An automatic fire extinguisher system is installed along with twin smoke alarms and an on-board telephone.

Mr Stephen Turton, the School's Finance Director said: "The total cost of this new mini bus is £32,000 and the £1,900 raised by parents' voluntary contributions during 1995/1996 has been used towards this total. So a very big "Thank You" to everyone who donated. We will be asking for further contributions in the near future to help with the running expenses of the new vehicle".

Mr Turton emphasised that in choosing this make and model of vehicle, top priority had been given to the students' safety.

Information Technology Update

Thomas Telford School is investing in a major upgrade of its network and embarking on staff and curriculum development in a variety of technologies including the use of its video suite, CD ROM production unit and a 'multimedia for all students' policy over the next few years.

To accommodate our growing Sixth Form, Learning Base 6 has been converted into a new Independent Learning Centre. Over February half term, multimedia facilities for 40 students were installed with the generous support of The Mercers' Company.

On the provision of Information Technology at Thomas Telford School, Mr Michael Wakeford, Clerk to The Mercers' Company and Governor at TTS commented: "It is important that we maintain our position at the leading edge of development".

Richard's Romanian Adventure

Sixth Form student Richard Walmsley spent two weeks last summer in Romania. The Venture Scout group of which Richard is a member, had volunteered to help run a summer camp for Romanian Orphans.

Richard commented: "I was very glad that we were able to help, even in a small way, but I must admit that the conditions we found in Romania were very distressing. The orphanage was like a prison with cracked windows, cramped sleeping arrangements and very poor sanitation. Some of the children seemed to be in poor health too. It made us all realise just how fortunate we are - for these children, an extra blanket or even just warm water for washing would be the ultimate luxury."

Richard's Venture Scouts continue to support the orphanages by collecting funds and food parcels which are delivered to Romania on a regular basis by Lancashire based charity, Romanian Challenge Camp.

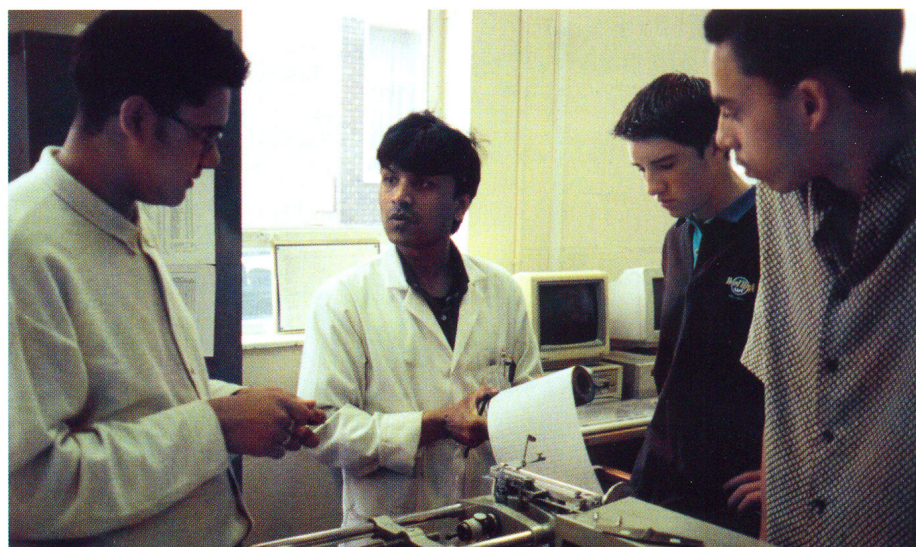
