Leading the Way with New Classroom Technologies

Whiteboard Technology

The School now has four electronic whiteboards. They are located in the English, Humanities and Business Learning Bases. An electronic whiteboard operates as a normal whiteboard but uses an electronic pen which acts as a computer mouse, the board acting as a huge computer screen.

This means that teachers can demonstrate anything that can be seen on a computer to a full class of students. For example, a multimedia CD-ROM of Hamlet can be used allowing sound clips and video clips to be played to the class. Videos can be started and paused to allow time for discussion and questions - all controlled by the teacher using the electronic pen. The boards are directly linked to the School network and to the Internet. This means that any of the millions of pages on the world wide web can be displayed to the full class.

Extensive use is made of this facility, for example, in Geography lessons, satellite images that are only minutes old are used by teachers to illustrate the movement of weather patterns. In Science lessons, direct links to animated graphics illustrating the movement of molecules, usually based in an American University, can be made.

Internet Access to the Curriculum

All Thomas Telford School students with network IDs and passwords can access the School Intranet from home if they have internet access. When students access the School home page on the world wide web and select the Telford Learning Grid, they will be asked for their details. Once these have been entered the whole of the curriculum intranet can be accessed. At present this consists mainly of Sixth Form material.

A new project will put the entire curriculum from Year 7 to Sixth Form on the School Intranet. This will take most of next year to complete. Students will be able to see what homework and class work they will be getting, in advance, by checking the Intranet in School or from home.

Virtual Classroom

The Virtual Classroom at the School has linked up with a number of other schools using electronic whiteboards and video conferencing.

A poetry lesson about First World War poet, Wilfred Owen, was given by Head of English, Miss Michelle Williams, simultaneously to a group of Year 10 students here and Year 10 students located about 150 miles away at Dixons City Technology College in Bradford.

Student desk microphones allowed students to talk to the remote teacher and to their fellow students at the other school. The large 52 inch TV in our Virtual Classroom gave a superb picture of the remote classroom and students.

Another virtual lesson was delivered to Telford from Bradford. This was an IT lesson about the Microsoft Access database software, delivered as part of the GNVQ Advanced IT course. The remote teacher sent our students their homework by electronic mail.

Mr Len Adam, IT Consultant, commented: "Students were very enthusiastic on both these occasions".


National Science Week




Rebecca's Gift of Expression

Her Majesty The Queen greeted Holly, her friend Rachel Dancer from Sheffield and two donkeys, Joshua and Tinker, in the gardens of Buckingham Palace. The charity walk began at the gates of Balmoral Castle on The Queen's Birthday in April and ended at the gates of Buckingham Palace on the eve of Her Majesty's Official Birthday in June. Holly and Rachel then walked on to Downing Street where they were met by the Prime Minister's wife, Cherie Blair and two of her children. The girls were the special guests of Her Majesty at the Trooping the Colour ceremony the following day.

Holly commented: "The first day meant a lot to me - Her Majesty allowed us to walk through her private estate at Balmoral. Everyday there was different scenery from the rugged mountains of Glenshee to the beautiful Yorkshire Dales. I felt that it was a real privilege to meet The Queen but I felt the greatest privilege was to be chosen to do the walk and to achieve what I had set out to do which was to raise £40,000 on behalf of disabled children."

The Michael Elliott Trust will use the cash to improve the facilities for disabled people at the Freshfields Donkey Sanctuary in Derbyshire.

Tasty Careers Menu

'Investors in Careers' is on the menu for Mr Birkett, Director of Careers and Industry Links. It is an externally assessed Kitemark of excellence which gives a school public recognition for the quality of its careers programme.

Mr Birkett said: "We have updated our Careers, Education and Guidance Policy (copies are available for parents, students and external visitors in the Careers Resource Centre) and we are on line for assessment during this summer." The policy sets out the services that students can expect from the Careers Department. It includes a planned programme of Careers Education. Individual guidance is available from the School's Industrial Consultants and Shropshire Careers Service. There is a 'drop-in' Careers Resource Centre with up-to-date information on career opportunities and support is given for job search including CV preparation, interview skills and action planning. This provides an opportunity to experience the world of work.

The Careers Team are also pioneering a Careers Discovery Programme for Year 10 students and their parents. They will work together with School and Shropshire Careers Service staff to learn the 'nuts and bolts' of how to research different careers. Mr Birkett said: "I welcome any ideas parents and students may have for improvements in our careers service. Please contact me at School."
