





Second Charter Mark for the School

Thomas Telford School has been awarded a Charter Mark, the Government's prestigious award for excellent public service. This is the second time that the School has achieved Charter Mark status. This Award, which is held for three years, was first presented to TTS in 1995 by the then Prime Minister, John Major.

Last year, the School submitted a further application and was rigorously assessed against nine criteria. Two Charter Mark Assessors from the Cabinet Office spent a day at the School in October meeting with staff, students and groups of parents and industrial contacts.

Mr Satchwell said: "The Assessors were impressed by their visit and their report on the School was excellent.' The following quotations are from their report:

Director of Careers and Industry Links, John Birkett, commented: "Challenge Plus is an excellent idea. It was a delight to see the students grow in confidence as the day progressed".

Mr Satchwell added: "The School works closely with Shropshire Careers and is leading the way with innovative ideas such as the Careers Discovery Programme which gives Year 10 students and their parents the opportunity to learn how to research different careers."

Prestige, a Young Enterprise Company run by Sixth Form Business students, organised a successful fashion show in January. This was the first time that such an ambitious event had been planned by a Young Enterprise Company at the School.



Students Benefit from Parents' Fund Raising Successes

Members of the Social Development Committee have worked tirelessly over the past twelve months to raise funds for the School. The Committee, a subgroup of the Parents' Advisory Council, has organised Quiz Nights, a Summer Fayre, a Christmas Draw and, for the first time this year, a Christmas Fayre. All of these events have been very well supported by students, parents, staff and friends of the School and, as a result, the Committee has been able to provide thousands of pounds for the purchase of a wide variety of extra equipment for the benefit of all the students. The Committee receives bids from various departments and has complete autonomy when it comes to deciding which projects should be supported.

Over the past twelve months the Committee has donated £800 towards the cost of weather satellite equipment. £700 has also been given to the Careers Department for an extra computer with Internet access. Foreign Languages has benefited from the purchase of a new overhead projector and the Humanities Department has been able to provide a new set of atlases at a cost of almost £600. The Committee has provided money for extra kits for sports teams and the Performing Arts Department has also gratefully received a donation towards the cost of staging the 1999 School Production of 'Oklahoma'.

Operation Christmas Child

Operation Christmas Child provides Christmas parcels for children in refugee camps, hospitals, orphanages and schools across Eastern Europe and TTS students collected 185 shoe boxes full of gifts. This was the first time that the School had taken part in the project and contributions were received from almost every Tutor Group.

Mrs Evans, who masterminded the School's effort, commented: "I was overwhelmed by the response from the students. It was a magnificent effort and I hope that we can do even better next year."
