



Thomas Telford School students made history when they achieved a 100% success rate in their GCSE examinations with every single student in Year 11 gaining six or more A*-C grades. In fact, 91% of the students achieved 10 or more top grades! These fantastic results meant that TTS was once again named as top of the nation's 4,000 comprehensive schools in the Government's league tables, published in November and for a few days the School was at the centre of national media attention. Mr Satchwell said: "The whole School coped magnificently with the influx of journalists and cameramen. Students, staff and parents were interviewed and photographed for newspapers and we played host to TV crews from all the major channels. Some students were even interviewed live by satellite for the lunchtime news!"

Heartfelt congratulations to students, parents and staff and especially to our teachers for the outstanding Ofsted Report just received. I am advised that the standards of teaching are the highest ever recorded in an Ofsted Report. 100% of all lessons seen were graded at Good or Better, with 70% of those Very Good or Excellent. Life on the Ocean Wave

Sixth Form students, Laura Norris and Christopher Byrne, experienced life on the high seas when they sailed from Southampton to Gdansk in Poland as members of the ship's crew aboard 'Sir Winston Churchill'.

From Southampton, the 'Sir Winston Churchill' sailed through the Kiel Canal to the Baltic Sea. The crew went ashore at Kiel and were also able to spend a few hours in Copenhagen while the ship was resupplied.

The ship is a 300ft three-masted topsail schooner and has a permanent crew of five – the Master, Chief Officer, Bosun, Engineer and Cook. The rest of the crew comprises groups of 'volunteers'.

Working in watches, Christopher and Laura took on various roles from cooking and cleaning to steering the ship through sea conditions that varied from flat calm to huge waves and storm force 9 winds.

This was certainly no easy holiday for Laura and Christopher who commented: "It was incredibly hard work but it was tremendous to sail in one of these wonderful ships. It was a character building experience that gave us an opportunity to test our ability to face new challenges. There was a great team spirit on board the ship and we have kept in touch with several new friends."

Senior Industrial Consultant, Mr Malcolm Scotto, added: "Students have been participating in this Tallships Experience for the past seven years and we are indebted to The Mercers' Company who have sponsored two students each year. Any students who would like to participate in future voyages should register their interest with me."

Enterprising Ideas

Year 8 students took part in a Business Enterprise competition, sponsored by NatWest Bank.

The students formed 41 companies to make and sell products at the Summer Fayre. They decided on product ideas, conducted market research with their target market, raised finance and looked into sales promotion and merchandising techniques. A number of partnerships also managed to raise sponsorship from companies including Beatties, Chester Zoo and the Falcon Hotel in Wellington.

Students produced a wide variety of stalls ranging from arts and crafts to fortune hunting. There was even a prize of a helicopter ride on offer from Twilight, one of the companies!

NatWest opened accounts for each company and prizes were awarded in seven categories: team work, point-of-sale display, product design, most profit and special awards for best overall business, best overall individual and the "Richard Branson" Award for entrepreneurial skills.





Patent Pending

When David Samuel left TTS last Summer with A grades in A Level Design Technology and Business Studies, he did not pursue the more obvious route into university but instead set up a company with the father of one of his school friends. The Telford-based company is called SamRey and will develop, manufacture and market David's revolutionary design for a small wind turbine. This new turbine is designed to generate power where it is to be consumed, a system which is simple, cheap and efficient.

David commented: "My turbine can provide economical power for individual homes or schools and any excess power could be sold into the National Grid. In Third World environments where remote villages do not have any access to power, electricity generated by a small wind turbine can provide power for medical and educational facilities as well as allowing small enterprise to flourish. We are now in the final stages of prototyping the equipment and we hope to sell our first turbine later this year."

Mr Satchwell said: "Our good wishes go to David and his partner for the success of this marvellous enterprise."






