2005 - Our Best Ever Year!

The Headmaster comments:

2005 has been a record breaking year for Thomas Telford School. We have achieved our 'best ever' in a variety of fields.

The GCSE results in August 2005 were once again outstanding with all the students exceeding the Government benchmark of five A*-C grades for the sixth year in succession. In fact, 98% of them achieved 12 or more passes at these higher grades! The students achieved our best ever average points score of 771 which is, I believe, a national record. Analysis of the School Performance Tables for 2005 shows that TTS is the best performing school in the country at GCSE level.

I was particularly delighted by the results for Mathematics, English Language and Literature where there was a 98% pass rate at A*-C in these three core subjects.

Our best ever A Level results, creating an average points score of 405 per student, meant that for the first time TTS was the best performing comprehensive school in the country at Sixth Form level. I am absolutely delighted with this improvement. None of these results would have been possible without the combination of hard work and dedication of the students and staff and the magnificent support of the parents. Thank you to you all.

In 2005, we recorded another best ever which will probably never be repeated when all six of our Boys Football teams won or shared their Shropshire County Cups. A truly amazing record - well done boys! Details of this and all the other sporting achievements can be found on Pages 12-16.

Melissa's Sponsored Walk

Sixth Form student Melissa Wolfe received widespread publicity for her sponsored walk which took place during the TTS Summer Fayre in July when she walked 300 yards in front of her family, friends and TV cameras from Central News!

Melissa was left paralysed at the age of 13 by a trampolining accident during training for the national gymnastics championships when she fell badly while somersaulting. Doctors told her that she would never walk again but, following pioneering laser treatment in France and with her remarkable strength and determination, Melissa can now walk with the aid of callipers. This treatment in France costs £1,000 a time and Melissa's family has had to raise funds to cover these costs. So far, they have raised over £20,000 through sponsorship and a variety of fund raising events.

Miss Viv Evans, Deputy Head, commented: "Melissa has shown extraordinary courage and determination to walk again and has marvellous support from her family. Her grandmother, Jean Boyd, was named UK Grandparent of the Year in September 2004 for her dedication to Melissa since the accident."

Fiddler on the Roof

The award winning musical, 'Fiddler on the Roof', was the TTS Annual Production for 2005.

It tells the story of Tevye the Milkman, a Jewish peasant in Tsarist Russia at the beginning of the Twentieth Century and his attempts to maintain his family and religious traditions while adapting to the pressures of modern life.

Production Coordinator, Ms Caroline Crawford said: "The show ran for four consecutive nights so, as in the past, students shared the leading roles. 'Tevye' is a particularly demanding role in terms of the dialogue and singing and both Sam Jones and Sean Weston gave very convincing performances."

"One of the highlights for the cast was the dream

sequence which was very funny and enjoyable to do. The show was a challenge for the students as it was unfamiliar but, by the final curtain, we all agreed that it was one of the best yet."

A sentiment echoed by many members of the audience.

Scientific Investigations on Show

The Science Fair in July was the culmination of six weeks of intensive project work for Year 8 students when the fruits of their research and investigation into scientific topics were on display for their fellow students, parents and friends to see.

The projects were assessed by a team of judges during the afternoon and the winning team received the TTS Science Trophy from Sir Kevin Satchwell.

Mr Simon Rogers, Deputy Head with responsibility for Science said: "Students had the opportunity to behave like real scientists and research an area of science that interested them. The many exciting projects included 'Do You Need Money to be a Honey?' which investigated if there are any differences between commercially made and home made

cosmetics; and 'The Ultimate Memory Test' which aimed to answer that age old question 'are women brainier than men?'."

Amongst the many other topics, one team had followed the Jamie Oliver trail with the students investigating whether healthy foods have an effect on intelligence. They were dedicated to their cause, eating eggs, Brussels sprouts and fish oils daily to see if it enhanced their performance in a memory test!

Charlotte Monk, Helene Goransson and Abigail Cooper were the eventual winners with high scores for a well organised and scientific approach to their research. They chose to investigate the effectiveness of different stain removers on common household stains. The title of their project was 'Do You Judge a Stain by its Fame'. The girls came up with some interesting results, with 'Oxy Magic' coming out on top.

African Adventures

Africa is the destination for two Sixth Form students as part of their extended work placement programme.

Patricia Snook spent ten days in Ethiopia at the site of the Tekeze Hydro Dam which is due for completion in 2012. The 12 year project employs 3,000 local people and Patricia spent time with the Chief Geologist, Hydrology, Environmental and Construction Engineers as well as the Chinese doctor. Patricia's work experience diary records vivid accounts of the poverty and amazing tales of snakes in the bathroom and scorpions lurking next to boots.

She said: "At the local Sebuko School, I taught English to some of the children and was struck by their enthusiasm and excellent behaviour. It is heartbreaking to see that they get only a very basic education when they are so keen to learn and work their way out of poverty."

Patricia has set herself a goal to raise £2000 to provide materials to aid the structural development of the school and to help purchase basic books and equipment.

Meanwhile, Claire Millward is looking forward to spending ten days visiting villages and schools in Sierra Leone in February with a group of people who have raised funds to purchase computers and IT equipment. They will see how this equipment is being used and assess what else the group can do to help in the future.

Senior Industrial Consultant, Mr Malcolm Scotto who coordinates the programme explains: "We are keen to support students who wish to broaden their personal development and career prospects. Patricia and Claire have taken advantage of excellent opportunities which will be of great benefit to them in the long term."

Robotic Skills Put To The Test

Joshua Poole and Paul Rogers travelled to Genoa in Northern Italy earlier in the year to take part in the Edurobot project for which they had to design, assemble and programme a robot to take part in a Predator and Prey competition.

The TTS students were competing against teams from Germany, Poland, Belgium, Spain, Italy and Greece. Josh and Paul finished eleventh overall out of 24 teams taking part.

Mr Mark Hudson, Deputy Head with responsibility for Design Technology accompanied the students. He commented: "The competing robots were all built around a control unit which was then modified and programmed

either as Hunter or Prey. The boys were calm under pressure and can take great satisfaction from the fact that in the initial heats, competing against teams two or three years older than them, they beat both the overall competition winners and runners up."

Engineering Experience

A group of fourteen students took part in a special Engineering Experience organised by the Smallpeice Trust.

The four day residential course, held at Harper Adams University College in Newport, provided the students with the opportunity to learn about engineering through a series of presentations and practical exercises.

Working in teams, they spent two days tackling 'real life' challenges on projects designed and facilitated by young engineers from industry. As well as working on the design, build and test elements of the projects, they developed life skills such as teamwork, communication, problem solving, time management, finance and presentation.

At a formal dinner at the RAF Museum, Cosford, the students presented their work to senior industrialists from major companies including Ford Motor Co, Rolls Royce, Jacobs Babtie, IBM, Smiths Aerospace and Devonport Management Ltd.

Philip Liebman said: "We had a really good time. My group worked on a Rolls-Royce project. We had to build a wind tunnel and, when they were tested, ours came second."




Maths Superstar!

Helen Barnett is a real Maths Superstar. She is an excellent mathematician who gained a Gold certificate in the UK Junior Mathematics Challenge in Year 8. Her score was so good that she and fellow student, Alex Nwenwu, were invited to take part in the UK Junior Mathematics Olympiad. Participation is reserved for just the top 1,200 entries in the country. In this competition, Helen achieved a Distinction, ranking her in the top 300 students out of the 240,000 original entries.

Helen also gained Level 8 in her Key Stage 3 SAT Maths test, scoring 145 out of 150, the best ever marks by a student at TTS. She hopes to take her GCSE in 2006.

Sporting Snippets





- Laura Pacey won the Year 8 Girls British Schools Biathlon at Bath University in March. To win this title, Laura had to run 1000m which she completed in 3 minutes and 13 seconds, followed by a 50m swim which she managed to do in a mere 30.63 seconds!
- Amelia Reynolds won the Gold medal for the Under 13 Girls Shot at the UK National Sportshall Finals in Birmingham with a superb throw of 10m 70cms, almost a metre more than her personal best.
- Jessica Huxley has been selected for the England Under 18 Rounders Team bringing an opportunity to play against the home countries and a possible trip to France for a European Tournament.
- Emma Hugh won a gold medal for 50m breast stroke at the English Schools National Swimming Championships in Manchester. Poetry Prize for James

James Davies won second prize in a national poetry competition to celebrate Einstein Year 2005. The competition, organised by the British Association for the Advancement of Science attracted around 2000 entries.

Deputy Head Mr Simon Rogers, who is in charge of Science, said: "James did very well to win second prize in such a prestigious competition. It's not often science and poetry come together in this way. When he was 26, Albert Einstein published three papers that changed the way we see the universe. These were on Special Relativity, Photoelectric Effect and Brownian Motion."

James commented: "The competition was called UNIverse and our poems had to be about a Physics topic - Energy, Space or Time. I called my poem 'The Universe'."

World Book Day

The Library held a Book Fair and several competitions to celebrate World Book Day in March.

Year 7 students unjumbled book titles and authors while Years 8 and 9 students had to match a book title from a list with the member of staff they thought might be reading that book. The Spread of Success

Thomas Telford School, along with The Mercers' Company, is the main sponsor of the newly built Walsall Academy which opened in 2003 and the new Sandwell Academy which opens in September this year. We are extremely proud of the progress being made at the schools where both the Headteachers, Mrs Jean Hickman and Mr Simon Topper, are former TTS Deputy Heads.

At the Walsall Academy, the 5+ GCSE pass rate at the higher grades has improved from 50% to 65.5% and it has just received an excellent Ofsted Report. Everyone at TTS sends congratulations to Mrs Hickman, her students and staff.

Mr Topper, has been working very hard to recruit the first intake into the Sandwell Academy which is located next to West Bromwich Albion Football Club. The Academy received 1350 applications for 180 places and is proving to be as popular with parents as TTS. Mr Topper is busy building a new team of staff and preparing the curriculum to get off to a flying start this September with the new intake in Year 7 and First Year Sixth Form. Everyone at

TTS wishes Simon and his staff good luck in establishing the new school.

TTS is also in a three year Federation with Madeley Court School which is due to end in Summer 2006. During this time, the 5+ GCSE pass rate at A-C grades has soared from 22% to 55%, with their target of 75% for 2006 achievable and within sight. Mr Vic Maher, yet another former TTS Deputy Head, is doing a brilliant job with his staff in transforming Madeley Court School into what will soon become the top performing state school in Telford & Wrekin - an incredible achievement considering it was the worst performing school in Telford three years ago!

Congratulations to Mr Alan Fowler and his staff who run the West Midlands Consortium for teacher training based at TTS. They received the highest possible accolade when OFSTED inspected their Graduate Teacher Training Programme (GTP) during 2005.

Established in 1993, the Consortium has links with 28 local schools. As well as the GTP, the Consortium runs Post Graduate Certificate of Education courses. Both these routes lead to Qualified Teacher Status.

1066 and All That!

The annual re-enactment of the Battle of Hastings took place on a perfect October day just before half-term.

The Norman troops of Year 7-TELF, under the command of Duke William (otherwise known as Omari Douglas), took on the Saxon's finest fighting machine (7-ORD) led by King Harold (Holly Wild).

The students participated with great enthusiasm and had made a fantastic effort with their costumes and shields. One very kind Grandmother had even knitted a very effective set of chain mail! Almost too realistic fake wounds had been created and severed limbs and fingers added to the effect.

The major roles were shared with Aiden Reynolds (a fantastic singer) and Adam Unwin (a very expressive actor) taking the major part of Joseph and four excellent singers, Helene Goransson, Laura Bailey, Laura Roper and Kelly Appleby sharing the very demanding vocal role of Narrators.

Golden Girls






